HYMNS OF THE DAY

Tone 1. Troparion of the Resurrection

WHEN the <u>stone</u> had been sealed by the <u>Jews</u>, * while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure <u>bo</u>dy, * Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, * granting <u>life</u> to the world. * The <u>pow</u>ers of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giv</u>er of Life: * "Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ! * <u>Glo</u>ry to Thy <u>King</u>dom! // Glory to Thy dispensation, O Thou Who <u>lov</u>est mankind!"

Tone 2. Troparion of the Sunday of Orthodoxy

WE <u>ven</u>erate Your most pure image, O <u>Good</u> One; * and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O <u>Christ</u> our God. * Of Your own <u>will</u> You were pleased to ascend the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh * and deliver Your creatures from bondage to the <u>En</u>emy. * <u>There</u>fore with thankfulness we cry aloud to You: * "You have filled all with joy, O our <u>Savi</u>or, // by <u>coming</u> to <u>save</u> the world."

Tone 4. Troparion of the Forefeast of Annunciation

TODAY is the prelude of joy for the <u>u</u>niverse! * Let us anticipate the feast and celebrate with exul<u>tation</u>: * Gabriel is on his way to announce the glad tidings to the <u>Virgin</u>; * he is ready to cry out in fear and <u>won</u>der: // "Rejoice, O Full of Grace, the <u>Lord</u> is with you!"

Glory. Tone 8. Kontakion of the Sunday of Orthodoxy

NO one could de<u>scribe</u> the <u>Word</u> of the <u>Fa</u>ther; * but when He took <u>flesh</u> from <u>you</u>, O Theotokos, He accepted to <u>be</u> described, * and restored the <u>fallen image</u> to its former state by uniting it to divine <u>beauty</u>. // We confess and pro<u>claim</u> our sal<u>va</u>tion in words and images.

YOU are the beginning of salvation for all of us on earth, Virgin Mother of God. * For the great Archangel Gabriel, God's minister, was sent from heaven to stand before you to bring you joy: // Therefore, we all cry to you: "Rejoice, O unwedded Bride!"

EPISTLE

The Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to the Hebrews (11:24-26, 32-12:2)

Brethren, by faith Moses, when he became of age, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt; for he looked to the reward. And what more shall I say? For the time would fail me to tell of Gideon and Barak and Samson and Jephthah, also of David and Samuel and the other prophets: who subdued through faith kingdoms. righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became valiant in battle, turned to flight the armies of the enemies. Women received their dead raised to life again. And others were tortured, not accepting deliverance, that they might obtain a better resurrection. Still others had trial of cruel mockings and scourgings, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented - of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth. And all these, having obtained a good report through faith, did not receive the promise, God having provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect without us. Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensuares us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith.

The Reading from the Holy Gospel According to St. John (1:43-51)

At that time, Jesus wanted to go to Galilee, and He found Philip and said to him, "Follow Me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found Him of whom Moses in the law, and also the prophets, wrote - Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." And Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward Him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no deceit!" Nathanael said to Him, "How do You know me?" Jesus answered and said to him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you." Nathanael answered and said to Him, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God!
